# Ash Wednesday



On Wednesday 6th March, all students were invited to participate in Ash Wednesday services, marking the beginning of Lent.

We were very pleased to welcome Father George Smulski from the Fransiscan Community at Woodford, and Father Kris from La Salette, Rainham to lead us in prayer.

The Gospel reading (Mt 6:1-6, 16-18) reminds us of the three pillars of Lent: Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving. Jesus encourages us to maintain a cheerful and humble disposition when going about these acts.

The use of ashes to mark a time of repentance and turning back to God originates in the Old Testament, where the people of Israel would cover themselves in ashes as a sign of sorrow for their sins.

For Catholics and many other Christian denominations, we continue this practice. A priest will burn and bless the palm leaves used on Palm Sunday in the previous year, and these ashes are then used to make a continuous link from one Lent to the next.

The ashes are then marked on the forehead, in the sign of the cross, with the words "Repent and believe in the Gospel".

Thank you to our priests, our readers and in particular our site team for helping us to run the day smoothly and in the reverent manner fitting to the season.

## Jubilee Icon Visits All Saints





We have been greatly honoured to be asked to host the official Jubilee Icon, commissioned by the Catholic Bishops of England and Wales in partnership with CAFOD, between the 6th and 7th of March.

This beautiful and thought-provoking icon is a powerful symbol of hope, faith, and justice, reminding us of the call to care for our global family and work towards a fairer world. The icon's presence in our school has been an opportunity for reflection and prayer as we stand in solidarity with those affected by poverty and injustice

The Icon was moved to the chapel for our Friday morning Mass, and our CAFOD young leaders and other students had the opportunity to pray with the icon at breaktime on Friday. Everyone has commented on the beauty of the piece and been fascinated to learn about it's origins.
