# REPENT, AND BELIEVE IN THE GOOD NEWS!

**MARK 14:15** 

We return to school on Monday 20th February and begin our preparations for our Ash Wednesday liturgies on the 22nd February.

As usual we will gather together as lower school and upper school communities to receive ashes on our foreheads as reminder that we are called to repentance, to amend our ways and follow the path God has set before us.

The ashes come from burnt palms from the previous year's **Palm Sunday Mass**. Palms are a living plant, and a symbol of victory and triumph, but they are burned to dust and become a symbol of sorrow and repentance.

We can trace the use of ashes back to the Old Testament. When Jonah preached repentance to Nineveh, the king covered himself in sackcloth and ashes and ordered the people to do the same (Jonah 3:6–9). Ashes and scratchy clothes were a way for people to be humble before God and show that they were willing to make a big change in their lives.

This Lent, we will be challenging our students to conform their hearts and minds more closely to God; to turn away from sin and believe in the Gospel. Please keep them in your prayers.



Our theme for the first week back at school is Reconciliation.

Understanding that we need to be reconciled to others and to God if we truly want to be Holy is a big challenge, but God does not ask us to do this without supernatural help. Accessing the Sacraments, particularly Confession and the Holy Eucharist, provide the graces we need to persevere in our pursuit of sanctity.

Our students are fortunate to have these opportunities throughout Lent - there is Mass every Friday and we hope to be able to offer confessions on multiple occasions before we reach Holy Week.

# SAINTS OF THE MONTH

St Polycarp - 23rd February

Polycarp, bishop of Smyrna, disciple of Saint John the Apostle and friend of Saint Ignatius of Antioch, was a revered Christian leader during the first half of the second century.

At 86, Polycarp was led into the crowded Smyrna stadium to be burned alive. The flames did not harm him and he was finally killed by a dagger. The centurion ordered the saint's body burned. The "Acts" of Polycarp's martyrdom are the earliest preserved, fully reliable account of a Christian martyr's death. He died in 155.

St David - 1st March

St David, Dewi Sant, was a leading figure and monk in the early Welsh Church who lived in this area in the sixth century. He founded a monastic community here living a simple, austere life in the Celtic monastic tradition which connected the people of Wales with Ireland, Cornwall, France and the Scottish Isles.


His last words to his followers, still repeated to this day, were "Be joyful, keep the faith, do the little things you have seen me do".

Ss Perpetua and Felicity - 7th March

In an attempt to slow the growth of Christianity in Africa, Roman Emperor Septimius Severus forbid subjects of the Roman Empire to convert. If they had converted and refused to renounce their faith, they were put to death. In 203 A.D., five catechumens preparing for baptism were arrested in the Roman city of Carthage (modern-day Tunisia). Among those catechumens were Sts Perpetua and Felicity. They were heroic young women and mothers who stood firm in their faith

# POPE FRANCIS' TOP 10 TIPS FOR LENT

Every year Catholics try to answer the age old question: What should I do for Lent? Well, who better to pick for as your Lenten spiritual director than Pope Francis? He has some great ideas for you! Here are 10 of his best tips:

### 1. GET RID OF THE LAZY ADDICTION TO EVIL

"[Lent] is a 'powerful' season, a turning point that can foster change and conversion in each of us. We all need to improve, to change for the better. Lent helps us and thus we leave behind old habits and the lazy addiction to the evil that deceives and ensnares us."

### 2. DO SOMETHING THAT HURTS

"Lent is a fitting time for self-denial; we would do well to ask ourselves what we can give up in order to help and enrich others by our own poverty. Let us not forget that real poverty hurts: no self-denial is real without this dimension of penance. I distrust a charity that costs nothing and does not hurt." - Lenten Message, 2014

### 3. DON'T REMAIN INDIFFERENT

"Indifference to our neighbor and to God also represents a real temptation for us Christians. Each year during Lent we need to hear once more the voice of the prophets who cry out and trouble our conscience. God is not indifferent to our world; he so loves it that he gave his Son for our salvation." - Lenten Message, 2015

### 4. PRAY: MAKE OUR HEARTS LIKE YOURS!

"During this Lent, then, brothers and sisters, let us all ask the Lord: 'Fac cor nostrum secundum cor tuum': Make our hearts like yours (Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus). In this way we will receive a heart which is firm and merciful, attentive and generous, a heart which is not closed, indifferent or prey to the globalization of indifference." - Lenten Message, 2015

### 5. TAKE PART IN THE SACRAMENTS

"Lent is a favorable time for letting Christ serve us so that we in turn may become more like him. This happens whenever we hear the word of God and receive the sacraments, especially the Eucharist. There we become what we receive: the Body of Christ." - Lenten Message, 2015

### 6. PRAYER

"In the face of so many wounds that hurt us and could harden our hearts, we are called to dive into the sea of prayer, which is the sea of God's boundless love, to taste his tenderness. Lent is a time of prayer, of more intense prayer, more prolonged, more assiduous, more able to take on the needs of the brethren; intercessory prayer, to intercede before God for the many situations of poverty and suffering." - Homily, March 5, 2014

### 7. FASTING

"We must be careful not to practice a formal fast, or one which in truth 'satisfies' us because it makes us feel good about ourselves. Fasting makes sense if it questions our security, and if it also leads to some benefit for others, if it helps us to cultivate the style of the Good Samaritan, who bends down to his brother in need and takes care of him." – Homily, March 5, 2014

### 8. ALMSGIVING

"Today gratuitousness is often not part of daily life where everything is bought and sold. Everything is calculated and measured. Almsgiving helps us to experience giving freely, which leads to freedom from the obsession of possessing, from the fear of losing what we have, from the sadness of one who does not wish to share his wealth with others." - Homily, March 5, 2014

### 9. HELP THE POOR

"In the poor and outcast we see Christ's face; by loving and helping the poor, we love and serve Christ. Our efforts are also directed to ending violations of human dignity, discrimination and abuse in the world, for these are so often the cause of destitution. When power, luxury and money become idols, they take priority over the need for a fair distribution of wealth. Our consciences thus need to be converted to justice, equality, simplicity and sharing." – Lenten Message, 2014

### 10. EVANGELIZE

"The Lord asks us to be joyous heralds of this message of mercy and hope! It is thrilling to experience the joy of spreading this good news, sharing the treasure entrusted to us, consoling broken hearts and offering hope to our brothers and sisters experiencing darkness." - Lenten Message, 2014
